At his instigation, the Director of the Anany-Bika "Golden Bull" Hotel, the work of Alfred Hajos, has agreed to place facilities at the disposal of the organisers. Concerts, sports demonstrations, swimming competitions, riding displays, projection of Olympic films for young people, a Hajos exhibition presented by the Budapest Museum for sport and physical education, a seminar organised by the Architects' Association... will feature on the programme. Finally, a commemorative plaque in marble will be attached to a wall of the hotel in memory of Alfred Hajos, who became a gifted architect after winning two Olympic swimming titles and an Olympic medal in the art competitions—an unprecedented achievement.
